Report from the Courageous Conversations Forum: Change in the Early Years March 25-27, 2015 By Janine Fraser (who was invited as the BCPTA President)

The forum began on Wednesday evening with a moving welcome from Musqueam Squamish elder Shane Point who spoke of change requiring courage, courage being the displacement of fear, fear being a mind-killer, and that dialogue requires equity. A very fitting opening for this conference, where the focus was on coming together to re-think early learning in BC. It was noted that in the room of 250 people were people in the field of early learning, school district reps like superintendants, local government reps, and health authority reps, and other interested individuals (like myself).

The keynote, Al Etmanski followed (author of "Impact: Six Patterns to Spread your Social Innovation" see www.aletmanski.com). He talked about social innovation and featured Adelaide Hoodless and the Women's Institute as an example of "the sacred waters" of social change that has created a large and lasting legacy in BC. He said that if one wants to make change in your community and in your society for the early years, you should look at this movement for inspiration.

The following day was spent with Joanne Schroeder as a facilitator (formerly with UBC's Help Program) highlighting things they have learned from the EDI: that research says early learning and family support, especially during the first three years of life makes a big difference. She shared the staggering fact that 33% of BC Kindergarten children are vulnerable and this number is not improving (and most likely getting worse). She said that we should not be ok with the fact that 1/3 of our kids are coming to school with a boulder on their backs. We have the capacity to change this by strengthening and changing the way we support children and families in the early years. The rest of that day was spent in smaller groups talking about best practices and what's working in communities right now that foster early learning and working together (health, MCFD, education, local governments etc). It was interesting to hear how some local governments create policies that foster and support early learning (tax breaks, reduced rents, parking fees going towards early learning, etc).


The last day ended with an address by Minister Stephanie Cadieux. The focus was on sharing the results so far of 12 early learning pilot projects that have run since 2012 in BC. Twelve communities were chosen where shared integrated service delivery happened to enhance early learning in those


communities. In other words, health, education and MCFD worked together to support families and children. It was announced that 14 more communities would have these integrated early year centres starting this spring and summer. "We will continue building on the success of these centres by further expanding the network – as budget allows- in order to reach more families throughout the province."

I am thankful I was at the forum, able to listen to the thoughtful and inspiring conversations and feel hopeful about the direction of early learning in the province. I truly understood when it was reported by Joanne Schroder, that the hardest transition in our education system was from the early years to Kindergarten, and I would love to see that improve.

To start with, I read "Tap the Magic Tree" by Christie Matheson. The kids loved this book but any book about spring would work really as long as it is visual. Then we brainstorm all the signs of spring and of course things that remind us of winter. I asked them what they see, small, hear, taste etc in these seasons. After brainstorming with the class, we wrote some of the poem together. This could be on chart paper or the smartboard. For my lower students, I allowed them to copy what we wrote as a class and they were then asked to come up with 1-2 ideas on their own. The stronger students had to come up with at least 4 lines on their own or, if they liked, they could write their own version entirely. I had a couple girls who did! This way it is differentiated for all learners.



Are you looking for a different and creative way for you students to show you what they know? Have you ever thought of having them use a FREE program called Tagxedo? Similar to Wordle, Tagxedo allows users to type in various words to create a visual image. Some of the unique options are choice of colour, shape, and orientation of the text. This user-friendly program allows users to save and share the image.


Some fun way to use this program in the classroom include:


- Special Theme Days Brainstorm a list of theme words and type them into a shape related to a special day (e.g., A Heart for Anti-bullying Day, an Earth for Earth Day)
- Class Community Provide your students with a class list and have them type in all of their names into a shape decided by the class. You can keep one copy in the classroom and each student can print a copy and take it home.
- Character Analysis Have the students write a list of adjectives describing a favourite character in a book and choose a shape that represents the character
- All About Me Have students brainstorm adjectives describing themselves and choose a shape that represents themselves Make a gift - Students can brainstorm a list of reasons why they love their Mom or Dad and type these into a special shape such as a heart. These can be framed and given as Mother's Day or Father's Day gifts.
- Predictions At the beginning of a unit or before reading a book, share a teacher-created Tagxedo with your students. Have them predict what the book or unit will be about.
- Math Application Use a Tagxedo to represent data. As you survey the class (e.g, What is your favourite type of pizza?), type each choice into Tagexdo. The more often one word is typed, the larger it will appear. This will create a visual representation of the data.





LITERATURE IN MATH: BOOKS BY GREG TANG

These books fit nicely into the Math curriculum and kids love them. Kids love riddles and these books are full of them. It's fun to use one riddle to start off your Math lesson each day. You may find your students asking for "one more" and "one more"! These books may already be in your school - they're worth digging out! Below are a few examples, but there are more.











Clouds

As part of a weather unit, one fun idea is to have students make their own diagrams of cloud types using cotton balls. First have them draw the ground with possibly their house and then glue on:

Cirrus Clouds: thin and wispy, easily see the sun, highest clouds

Cumulus Clouds: round, white and thick


Cumulonimbus Clouds: thunderstorms, tall, thick, grey (use a marker)

Stratus Clouds: expect a light drizzle, thick, grey and in layers

(closest to the ground)

Photography in the Classroom: Perspective Writing

Writing from another perspective than their own, is not always an easy task for young students. Here is an idea to try:

- 1. Ask your students if they have ever considered how various objects in the classroom feel. A chair? A keyboard? A whiteboard marker? What would they say if they could talk? This should get a very interesting conversation started!
- Read "The Day the Crayons Quit" by Drew Daywalt to help students get inside the head (perspective) of various colours of crayons.
- 3. Take a picture of an object in the classroom for each student to write from the perspective of. My students were very excited to choose!
- 4. Students glue the picture to the top of their page and then write below.
